We all had a wonderful time during the holiday season! We had the privilege to serve as ambassadogs at the *Holiday Pet Festival*, the *Glendale Hometown Christmas Parade* and during all the gift wrapping activities at *Barnes & Noble Booksellers*. We just had the best time meeting and greeting the customers and walking around strutting our stuff in our special holiday-colors donation vests, helping to raise money for *Arizona Golden Rescue*!

Speaking of strutting our stuff... There is another opportunity for you and your dog(s) to join us in a parade: the *Parada del Sol* in Scottsdale on February 11th. The parade route is only a little over a mile long, so most dogs and their humans will be able to walk that far. If your dog is like **Dolly**, please let Christine Spiel, the parade-group organizer, know so that we can bring enough wagons for all the dogs who will need one. If you have attended with your dog in the past, please have your dog wear the heart-fabric bandanna he/she was given; if you are new to this parade, you will get a bandanna of your choice.

Another fabulously fun event that comes up every spring is AGR's Paws At The Park, our annual meeting/BBQ picnic/fun day, this year on March 12th. We will be trying out a new venue on the east side of the Valley: *Eldorado Park* in SE Scottsdale, technically at 2311 N. Miller Rd. However, you will want to go north on 77th St, which is about 1¹/₄ miles west of Hwy 101 off McDowell Rd, as the parking lot is only about ¼ mile north of McDowell on 77th St – easy to find, plenty of parking, and not a huge distance for most of you to come. We are renting the East Ramada, but you can also bring a pop-up tent and chairs and/or a ground cover. There will be food, games for the dogs, a raffle and silent auction, **AGR** merchandise for sale, an Adoption Recognition Ceremony, a Rainbow Bridge Ceremony, and a Parade of Rescue in which any dog rescued from anywhere can participate. I usually write my newsletter column before getting those from the other Board members. When I read through theirs, I am often surprised how the same thread permeates everyone's column even when we don't have a specific theme for a particular issue. This time, the emphasis is on volunteers, or lack of, as the case may be.

We need more volunteers, particularly on our Home Evaluation Team and on our Transport Team. We also need more members to attend our events with or without their dog(s). We would like to keep our reputation of having a very well-coordinated and efficient Rescue operation, but it is becoming more and more difficult to get things done in a timely manner due to so few volunteers. For example, some applicants have waited for a home visit for as long as 3-4 weeks after sending in their application and their \$25 application fee, and these are people that live in the Valley, not in outlying areas of the state. That is too long. The majority of applications come in from East Valley residents: Scottsdale, Paradise Valley, Chandler, Gilbert and Mesa. Right now, two members who live in or close to Sun Lakes are taking many of the Southeast Valley home visits; one of them works full time and has only limited hours in which to do home evaluations. Most of the Scottsdale and Paradise Valley evaluations are done by one volunteer who also works full time, lives in Rio Verde (far northeast of Scottsdale) and will be retiring in the spring and no longer willing to drive so far to do home visits. We could really use a couple new home evaluators in Scottsdale and in the Chandler/Gilbert/Mesa area.

We will train you, whether that be for doing home evaluations or for doing transports. We require that you do at least two ridealongs with experienced members. We have a detailed home evaluation form we will give you that will guide you in looking around the inside and outside of the home to find anything that might be hazardous to a Golden. If you will consider doing transports, we have a Checklist that details everything you will need to do/bring for one of the five types of transports we have to do [i.e. shelter to vet, shelter to foster, vet to a foster or Foster-With-Intent-To-Adopt (FWITA), surrendering owner (SO) to vet, or SO to foster or FWITA.] We will provide you with an AGR name tag, and we encourage you to purchase a T-shirt or polo shirt with the AGR logo, but an AGR shirt is not essential or required. We will also train you how to enter the information from your home evaluation or transport into our database, so you do need to have access to a computer. Nothing is difficult – believe me, as technologically-challenged as I am, if I can do the computer work, just about anyone can! Each home evaluation takes 45 minutes to an hour; a transport could take more or less time depending on where the dog is and where it has to go. Mileage for any *AGR* activity is tax deductible, so if you itemize deductions you will need to keep track of mileage.

Thanks to everyone who did come to help at our numerous holiday season events. All are detailed in the *Here and There* section of this newsletter starting on page 21. We saw a few new faces, but we would like to see more at future events! Students and advisors from *Apollo High School's Key Club* were especially helpful at several of the gift wrapping sessions and at the *Holiday Pet Festival*.

Do you have a passion in life? Those of us who are very active in Rescue do – Rescue! Perhaps you will develop such a passion and enrich your life if you join us for some or all of the events that are scheduled this spring. They will be fun, you will get to know some really great, enthusiastic-about-Rescue people, your dog will get socialization experience and you will help us make some money – a win-win-win situation!

It's a Ruff Life!

2016 was a great year for *Arizona Golden Rescue*. We rescued 84 Goldens and Golden mixes. These lucky dogs were transported with care, all medical needs taken care of, and then the dogs were placed in loving homes.

Hmmmm, let me repeat myself... ALL MEDICAL NEEDS TAK-EN CARE OF... Yes, all medical needs of all 84 of these lucky rescued dogs were satisfied to the fullest, which comes with a very hefty price tag. Yes, the veterinary offices do provide *AGR* a discount on services. However, medical expenses averaged \$1,490 per rescued Golden in 2016!

Just how does AGR obtain all the funds to cover all these medical

expenses? Several different ways:

- 1. Adoption fees
- 2. Membership fees
- 3. Generous donations by *AGR* members and supporters
- Grants
- 5. Donations by the public at events AGR attends throughout the year.

Again, let me repeat myself... DONATIONS by the public at EVENTS AGR ATTENDS throughout the year. I attend probably 90% of AGR events during the year. I attend these events because I love the camaraderie of others who frequently attend these events. I love being able to take Nash and Jack to AGR events, which they love attending as well. I know attending 90% of our events is totally unrealistic for many AGR members. But, it would be nice to see SOME NEW FACES at events. Time and time again, I see the same dedicated AGR members attending events. I know you have heard the saying, "the more the merrier." But, also in this instance, not only are the more AGR members the merrier, but the more Goldens and members we have at these events the greater are the chances to receive donations from the public. How unfair would it be to future Goldens if AGR would have to limit medical treatment due to lack of funds when your Golden was 100% medically treated?

Also, these events are sometimes very exhausting by the time we unpack the trailer, set up the tables and pop-up tents, unpack and display the *AGR* merchandise, talk to the public during the event, pack up the *AGR* merchandise, take down the pop-up tents and tables, and finally pack up the trailer. If only a few extra *AGR* members attended in the beginning or at the end of the events to lend a helping hand, it would be SO MUCH APPRECIATED!

- Please take the time to look at the events calendar on the *AGR* website.
- Please take the time to attend an *AGR* event.
- Please help "paw it forward" for future rescued Goldens.

Paws Forward

With the beginning of a new year, I am compelled to examine what has remained the same and what has changed over the past year. *AGR* is an entirely volunteer organization with 100% of the funds going directly or indirectly for dogs and dog care. If you have considered donating time to us so that others can enjoy the happiness of having a new loving furry member of their household, now is a good time to start. The more volunteers, the lighter the load for each. Some assignments can be completed in a few hours while others are on-going. Below is a description of only those options directly involved with taking care of the dogs. There are other needed assignments addressed elsewhere in this issue.

It takes a lot of time and effort to accomplish what we have this past year. In 2016, 84 dogs came into our program. They ranged in age from the puppies born to a mother being fostered to a dog a family had had for 14 years. They included many apparently purebred dogs to a particularly endearing little dog, Waffles, that somehow snuck under the door. His heart may have been all that was Golden, but he had many interested in adopting him. Each dog needed to be treated differently.

Without dogs, the organization is unnecessary. The Intake Team, headed by Judy Petitto and Sharon Flores, is doing a terrific job. With changes in organization and assignments, our enthusiastic Team members have been locating dogs from new sources. We have more people walking the local shelters to locate dogs, and we are regularly checking with outlying shelters for Goldens. With new people in position with time-allocations arranged, new personal connections with sources for dogs are being created and these are beginning to pay off. As always, we still get most of our dogs from owners surrendering them to us.

The next team handling a dog is Placement. Debbie Mikol continues to manage that group. Her team matches dogs with families with consistent success. Their ability to locate a suitable match, sometimes within hours of being notified of a dog, is amazing. When there isn't a sufficient applicant pool for a specific dog, Placement finds a foster to hold the dog until appropriate applicants can be identified (or sometimes we have to board the dog for a while at a vet). Fosters are also needed for dogs with complicated medical issues. Debbie continues to train and guide people through this sensitive but rewarding assignment.

During this past year, the Transport team got a new manager, Sharon McKenzie. Sharon is also our behavior specialist and has proven invaluable both in assisting new owners with behavior issues and for assessing behavior of possible intakes.

This past year alone, dogs have been picked up or delivered from Tucson to Paulden (northwest of Prescott) and from Yuma to Globe. Even traversing our metropolitan area can require a trip that takes between 1½ and 2 hours, not accounting for the misnomer known as rush "hour". We have been able to coordinate more shared rides where one party goes half way and meets another transporter to complete the trip. It has also taken oversight to make certain everyone receives proper training before effecting a successful transport on their own. Sharon has ensured that transports are managed in a timely manner.

Assuring that Home Evaluations are conducted consistently and efficiently, Sheila Joyce continues to coordinate that function in her seamless way. Until an assignment is taken, she will, in the nicest way possible, keep the entire team apprised of the need for an evaluation in a certain location until someone offers. When needed, she has been able to expedite evaluations within days of an application being submitted. Liz Tataseo provides virtual home evaluations via Skype or Facetime for outlying areas of the state. Training is critical for home evaluators to assure consistency in application and comfort for the evaluator in knowing the duties. Consequently, we require potential new home evaluators to do at least two ride-alongs with experienced evaluators, plus we provide a handy detailed guide for what to observe in and around the home.

Liz Tataseo continues in the critical areas of Records Manager and Manager of the Vet Team. With staff assigned the coordination of exams at one of our participating vet clinics, we are assured that routine vet checks and follow-up on all known medical issues are addressed. We could use other participating veterinarians, particularly in the outer areas of the metropolitan area. Acute need is felt in the far southeast and southwest parts of the Valley. To add a new vet, we begin with the recommendations of people using clinics with which they are confident. Liz then contacts the clinic to ask if a working arrangement can be reached. When vets agree to work with our Rescue, we can almost guarantee them an increase in private-client business. Some vets don't want to increase the extent of their practice, but most do. So, if you take your dog(s) to a clinic other than the ones we use on a regular basis, please ask if they would be interested in working with us and let us know if they say yes.

If any of these functions sound like something you would like to do, please contact the manager of that area. Some tasks require committing availability to help for a week at a time, on a rotating basis with other team members. Others are specifics task for a time you can arrange. Some tasks always can use more help right now, while others may require waiting until there is an opening. Some tasks can be done in the comfort of your home, while others require literally getting out and about. No one will be asked to do something they do not feel comfortable or competent to do. All functions require a training phase for both your protection

and ours. Please consider helping deserving dogs find new loving homes. That is what we are about.



The Information Highway

As this newsletter reaches you, we are about to celebrate our 8^{th} anniversary as a rescue organization. Thanks to many members over the years for all their help in making us what we are today. We have streamlined almost all of the processes that we use to online processes rather than physical paper forms, and we have communications going out to members on a routine basis so that everyone is kept abreast of what is happening within AGR.

For a few of those eight years, we were taking in more dogs than we have in the last couple of years. The recent decrease is most likely due to the economy getting better and fewer dogs coming in because of foreclosures. As a reminder, in July 2016 we implemented a \$25 adoption application fee for all adoption applications submitted to AGR. The reason that this fee was instituted was to offset the fewer dogs coming into Rescue by reducing the number of applications coming in. The applications we get now tend to be from people who are seriously interested in adopting a rescued dog and are not just applying on a spur of the moment thought. So far, this approach also has reduced the number of applications. It also helps to reduce the number of home visits for which we need evaluators. All applications now, whether they be from new applicants or previous adopters, require the adoption application fee. If a dog is placed within one year, the \$25 is deducted from the adoption fee; if a family is approved and a year passes without a placement, a letter of donation will be sent to the applicant for tax purposes.

Although we are taking in fewer dogs each year, we still incur large medical bills. Owners are turning in dogs that they cannot afford to help medically and *AGR* accepts such dogs, so we still need to be proactive in our fundraising to stay viable.

Over the last 8 years, we have lost quite a few active members for matters of health, moving away from the area and other reasons. Although we have placed 768 dogs in the past eight years, the number of regular participants in our activities has diminished. We always wish and hope that a portion of the families who adopt from us will join us by participating in events to help us continue in our mission. We do understand that many members do not have the free time to join us at all events, but we thank those of you who have helped us. In hopes of encouraging additional participation, I will continue sending out e-mails during the month to let members know about upcoming events.

If you cannot help physically, please remember that there are many ways to help the organization. If you shop at any of the *Fry's Food & Drug* stores, please consider connecting your VIP card to *AGR*. Every quarter we receive a donation from *Fry's* based on the amount of purchases that have been made by the friends and members of *AGR*, and it does not cost you



and members of *AGR*, and it does not cost you anything extra or devalue your fuel points.



For all of you who shop online using Amazon, you can log on to Ama-

zon via smile.amazon.com and we will receive a percentage of your purchase as a donation from Amazon. Such a donation does not add to your purchase price. You just need to select *Arizona Golden Rescue* as the beneficiary of the donation.

Do you have a motor vehicle (operational or not) that you wish to get rid of? We have a working relationship with *CARS*. They will remove your vehicle at no charge to you, *AGR* will get a donation from the sale of the vehicle, and you will get a tax deduction for the donation.

If you walk, run or bike, consider downloading the app ResQWalk; then you can help out *AGR* with a donation made by ResQWalk. ResQWalk is a free app, available on Android and iPhone, which tracks your distance-related activities – walking, running or biking. It is easy and straightforward to use. After you download the app on your mobile device, select *Arizona Golden Rescue* as your preferred organization. Before starting your walk, run or bike ride, turn the app on and GPS will track your distance. ResQWalk will map your activity and keep track of your total distance over time. Each mile turns into \$\$ for *AGR*. For more information, go to www. resqwalk.com. Download the app for Android on Google Play Store and for iPhone on the App Store. Just search for ResQWalk.

"It's all about the dogs."

We say that a lot because that is why we are all part of this wonderful group. You would not be reading this if it were not for your love for the dogs. But as much as that is true, it takes a lot of hard work from a lot of people to keep this organization, and therefore the dogs, alive and thriving. Since this is the "Human Connection" column, in every issue I am going to continue to mention a few interesting facts and stories about some of the people you think you know. Hopefully, you will learn something new about them and gain more insight into how they got here. If you are interested in getting to know some of the members I have featured in this column and you have not received previous issues of this newsletter, you can download them from the Information tab on our website.



This quarter, let's meet Bert and Mary Engstrom, founding members sharing member number 43F. They were busy with work for a while but are now back and planning to be very active with *AGR* once again.

Bert and Mary Engstrom originally hale from the outskirts of Chicago. They moved to the Valley about 18 years ago and currently reside on the far western border of Litchfield Park,

near the White Tank Mountains. Their first Golden was an eightweek-old puppy named **Pal**, who became a family member when their son Chris was in kindergarten. **Pal** was the iconic perfect Golden and was the star of the neighborhood. He succumbed to an inoperable brain tumor at the age of nine. Six months later they met Deb Orwig at a **Barnes & Noble** holiday season gift wrap.

Mary was sobbing and still heartbroken over the loss of **Pal**. Deb, who was with **RAG** at the time, convinced them to fill out an application for adoption and within a month their beloved **Misty**, who was about one year old, came into their lives. **Misty** was a joy! Bert was on the Transport Team at the time and received a call to ask if they were interested in a puppy that was part of a litter. They went to see the puppies, and **Liberty** chose them!



Double the Golden love in six months! Then, one year on the way to the annual picnic, they became involved in a transport and fostering part of another litter of puppies. They ended up adopting the smallest puppy of the litter, Marley. Marley had chosen their son as his "person" and went to reside with him when he purchased his home. Along the way, five years ago after much persistence, Bert and Mary were able to rescue and domesticate a feral Australian Cattle Dog that was living in the desert, Charlie Bear. All of their dogs bonded beautifully. Unfortunately, all three of their dogs crossed over the Rainbow Bridge within a year's time. Hopefully **AGR** will soon be able to fill the void in the Engstrom home with another Golden. Bert is currently the Superintendent of Chemistry for APS-Palo Verde. Mary has retired after being a registered nurse for 35 years. She is currently on the Home Evaluation Team and has begun writing the "Magic Moments" section of The Golden Paw. They have one son, Chris, who resides in Goodyear. He tied the knot with Summer this past June.

You may have met Sandra Hansen, number 104, at many of our events and Meet-and-Greets. She has been a very active volunteer for many years. In Sandra's own words:

I moved to Arizona from Denmark in 1992 when I was 18 years old. I had just finished my dental assisting degree in Denmark, and had decided to take a year off before starting to work. My mother is American so her side of the



family lives in Arizona. My father and sister also had moved here from Denmark a few years before, which is the main reason why I came over; 25 years later and I am still here. With much encouragement and support from my employer at the time, I went back to college and was eventually accepted into the dental hygiene program in Flagstaff, where I spent 3 long years. I graduated from hygiene school in 2001 and have been cleaning teeth ever since.

I became acquainted with Arizona Golden Rescue in 2009. I had just seen the movie "UP" and thought that the dog "Dug" was just the most adorable friendly Golden Retriever, and it started me thinking about getting a dog. A few weeks later, I went to Choice Pet Market to buy cat food. AGR was there doing a "meet-andgreet" with lots of beautiful happy Goldens. I filled out the adoption application, had my home evaluation done, and shortly thereafter got my first dog, Duke. I have adopted 5 dogs from AGR since 2009: Duke, Missy, Jasmine, Tatum and Sadie. Duke started my

love of senior dogs. **Duke**, **Missy** and **Tatum** were all over the age of 9 when they came into Rescue. **Sadie** was 7, not a senior, but I took her in to foster, because she had epilepsy. I became a foster 'failure/success' yet again. I had **Duke**, **Missy**, **Tatum**, and **Sadie** for less than a year each, not long enough. I recently lost my girl **Jasmine**, whom I had the longest (6 years), and not a day goes by that I don't think of her.

I am the Membership and Microchip Manager for AGR. When it's time for you to renew your membership with AGR and you get a membership renewal letter and application in the mail, I am the one sending them. Often the adoption fee you paid does not cover the medical expenses for which AGR paid and provided for your dog, so please always consider renewing your membership and thereby continuing your support of AGR. When you adopt a dog from AGR, in addition to general/senior blood work, heartworm test, valley fever test, and other medical needs attended to, your dog also gets microchipped if it isn't already. Part of my responsibility is to ensure that the vets we use have our microchips when they need them. After the dog has been microchipped, I register the dog with the microchip company. A couple years ago we took in a dog that had been a stray. The person surrendering the dog had looked for the owners and couldn't find them. Thankfully the dog

was microchipped; however, when I called the microchip company, I found that the owner information was out of date. I was able to track down the owner by calling the vet that had implanted the microchip. Please always update AGR with your current phone number and address. AGR is always the primary contact for the dog, because we are not moving or going anywhere. I enjoy volunteering with AGR and hope to do so for many more years. In my spare time, besides volunteering for AGR, I like to read and hike, and I knit/crochet for a couple of charity groups. I am currently a slave/waiter for 4 cats.



Finally, let's meet Sarah Martin, number 171, again in her own words:

Health and Safety

When we are out in public collecting donations or doing major fundraising, we always say it is for the dogs! That money does go directly to vet costs to make sure each dog is as healthy as possible, so that they can be happy and healthy in their forever homes. We are able to work with several great animal hospitals that give us discounts so that we can pursue needed vetting for each dog.

Our veterinarians include Four-Legged Friends Animal Hospital in Phoenix – Dr. Valerie Ferguson has worked with us since the beginning; Kennel Care in Chandler, which has cared for many of our very sick dogs for almost 8 years; Animal Medical & Surgical Center in Scottsdale, now open

24/7, is a state-of-the-art hospital and their vets have saved many of our dogs; *Raintree Medical Center and Resort* in Scottsdale, which joined us the last two years; *Stetson Hills Animal Hospital*, which has served our Anthem adopters but has now moved closer to Glendale and north Peoria; and *Academy West Animal Hospital* in Glendale, which has given us the security of both boarding and vetting, especially with emergency intakes. We also occasionally work with vets in Flagstaff, Prescott, Sierra Vista, Tucson and Yuma. If you live in one of these outlying areas and need a recommendation for a vet, please don't hesitate to contact us.

We also have partnerships with many specialists: Animal Health Institute – Companion Animal Clinic at Midwestern University, Arizona Dental Specialists, Arizona Oncology, Dermatology for Animals, EyeCare for Animals, VetCare Internal Medicine, Vet-Med (internal medicine and emergency services) and Veterinary Neurological Center, to name a few.

The basic vetting we do for each dog during the initial three-week foster period is:

- health exam
- valley fever test (normally not done on a puppy under 6 months of age)
- heartworm test (normally not done on a puppy under 6 months of age); heartworm prevention medication pro-

- vided for two months
- rabies and distemper/parvo vaccinations if not current
- bordatella vaccine if staying at the vet for more than an appointment or if beginning obedience training at a facility (*Partners, Master's Kennels, PetSmart, Petco*)
- spay or neuter (normally we recommend neutering and spaying at about 10 months)
- implantation of an AVID microchip
- fecal if indicated by dog's history, appearance of stool, or if dog is a puppy
- senior panel if over 8 yrs of age
- ear infections, lumps, bumps, physical issues and preexisting conditions will also be addressed during the exam

If warranted by the exam, dogs may be referred to a specialist for follow-up and treated for the condition. Financial coverage for follow-up exams and treatments needed for any ongoing illness or condition will be included for three months after finalization of the adoption.

In order to get the basic vetting done for each dog, two different avenues exist. If the dog comes from a shelter or is an emergency intake, the dog will, in the majority of those cases, go to one of our veterinarians first before being placed in their forever home. If an intake is a regular intake from a surrendering owner, the dog will most likely be placed in its new home first and the new family will take the dog to one of our veterinarians through a regular appointment, at their convenience, within the first few days the dog is in their home. *AGR* will be responsible for all vet bills until an adoption is finalized.

Each animal hospital has a dedicated *AGR* volunteer that coordinates vetting between the family and the veterinarian and is available for follow-up and any needed questions the family may have about the health of their dog. The Health Care Manager is also available to do follow-up or to answer questions regardless of the veterinarian being seen.

Service Paws By Wendy Enos

Editor's Notes: Wendy originally wrote this column six years ago when she had a service dog named Sophie. Sophie passed away in 2015; Wendy now has Cubbie, pictured with her above. Although some of the dogs AGR has rescued have become service dogs, AGR does not provide service-dog training – that is left up to the adoptive family. If a family acquires a dog from a Rescue or another source, there is a terrific local organization that can help the family learn how to train the dog as a service dog: Happy Tails Service Dogs (http://happytailsservicedogs.com/) Their services are free for the handler – the only thing necessary is a commitment to pursue the training until it has been completed, which may take anywhere from nine months to two years.

Getting It Straight: It's a Service Dog's Life

Imagine your puppy's ideal life, carefree with perpetual playtime, naptime, and chowtime. She gets special praise, loving, or treats when she does something that pleases you, and her life just could not get any better.

Now, throw in service dog training where, all of a sudden, her playful games have turned into commands which quickly invade her playtime. Hours each day for the next couple of years, she drills and works hard to master these commands.

Then it is time to go to work, every day, all day long, and on call 24/7. Working or not, she's never allowed to do most things other dogs get to do... no barking, no eating people food, no sniffing, and no chasing cats, birds, or other small creatures.

These are many people's sad misconceptions of the life of a service dog, so let's look at it from a different angle... Sophie's point of view. "Don't feel sorry for me," she'd tell you. "I've got it made. Sure, service dog training was rigorous and tough... for Wendy, but not for me. I made friends and played new games like 'brace' and 'touch' and 'pull.' And then I got to spend hours each day playing those games at home with her. She always made them fun! My life as a service dog is awesome! I meet and get fussed over by new people every time I work, and I go for more car rides and outings than any other dog I know. Sometimes my work is tedious and boring, but I get to be right at the side of the most precious person in the world to me. I walk store aisles with her, lie underneath the pew in front of her at church, and snuggle up underneath the table at restaurants. I'll admit I don't understand why she won't share her food with me, but, after we leave, she makes sure I get a high-end paycheck, like a Beggin' Strip® or half a string cheese, and that's just mighty fine with me!"

Another common misconception is that service dogs are never allowed to be regular dogs, do dog things, or enjoy a dog's life. *Au contraire* – you should see **Sophie's** toy box, the holes she has

dug in the back yard, and claw marks on the walls of the barn and the garden where she has gotten carried away chasing geckos and the occasional mouse. Her treat jars are always full, and heaven help us if we run out of string cheese or peanut butter, her ultimate treats! Oh, she's a regular dog, all right!

I believe she'd agree that her greatest treat, far surpassing any other, is the satisfaction she gets for a job well done. Looking into her eyes after she has caught me during a fall, picked up something I dropped, or walked me safely across a crowded intersection, I've seen a sparkle of pride! She'll take praise and a hug over a biscuit any day!

Follow the Lead By Deb Orwig

With this issue, we are going to begin including a column about dog behavior and training. In the future, Sharon McKenzie, *AGR's* Behavior Consultant, will be writing the article, but since I sprung the idea on her too close to the newsletter copy deadline for her to even think about it, I am going to compose this one.

Sharon planted the seed for this article by sending me the following vignette that she found on Facebook, which I rarely visit:

In order for a dog to be stubborn he must first understand completely what is asked of him and then choose to disobey. There are very few stubborn dogs in the world. There are, however, many dogs who are untrained.

AGR treats behavior problems the same way we treat medical ones: we will take whatever steps necessary to help a dog become a good family member. In the *Health and Safety* article on pages 9-10, Liz Tataseo details what we do medically for a rescued dog. In this column, we will focus on behavior and training.

We have found that often it is the family that needs training, as well as the dog. Many of our adopters have never had to train a dog – either they have never had a dog, or the one(s) they had did not need much training. When confronted with some undesirable behaviors, they may not know how to handle them. Problems may include counter-surfing, chewing on things other than dog toys, jumping up on people, barking too much, wanting to bolt out the door, digging in the yard, not paying attention when a command is given, having potty accidents in the house, and not walking well on leash. All of these behaviors can be corrected if one knows how – **AGR** provides the how.

If a dog comes into Rescue with behavior problems, we contact Sharon McKenzie. She usually will call the potential adoptive family and discuss the dog's behavior issues. Sometimes, all it takes is a suggestion or two and maybe some follow-up e-mails or calls to determine if the dog is improving. Very often, however, she will actually go to the home of the foster or Foster-With-Intent-To-Adopt (FWITA) and do hands-on work directly with the dog and the family. Many times she has gone to a home more than once.

Sharon's biggest asset in my opinion is that she listens. Then, she delves into her extensive mental repertoire of training techniques and makes suggestions to the family, actually demonstrating such techniques personally. She is very patient and very competent, and *AGR* is lucky to have her do this important job for us. Teryl Hall, who preceded Sharon as our Behavior Consultant, was the same way, and we were lucky to have Teryl's services for six years.

If Sharon is not comfortable with the progress being made by the dog and the family, or if it is apparent before the dog is even placed that serious behavior modification is necessary, then we will resort to one of two things:

- (1) AGR will pay for one series of weekly basic obedience lessons for the FWITA and dog at either Partners Dog Training School in Cave Creek or at Master's Kennels University in Gilbert; in this case, we will not finalize the adoption until the class series has been completed. If a family's work schedule or location is such that they cannot manage classes at either of these facilities, then we will hire a professional trainer who will go to the home.
- (2) If the dog is totally out of control and needs direct professional one-on-one help, we will register him/her for the 3-week in-house (i.e. boarding and training) "boot camp" at *Partners*. In a couple of rare cases, the dog has had to stay at *Partners* for at least a second three-week session. One dog was there for four months! This dog, who was about 6 years old when we rescued him, had been a stray, trusted no one and had never had any training. Although he is very picky about his canine friends (i.e., he does not like most other dogs) and is still not very trusting of strangers, he is now a wonderful, well-behaved companion dog for one of our members.

In my *AGR* experience of almost 8 years, we have never had to have a dog euthanized due to unmodifiable behavior, other than for aggression of which we were unaware when the dog came into Rescue. Our Intake Team members are trained to detect aggression in a surrendering owner's statements about the dog. However, in rare instances an owner has lied, told Intake what he/she thought we wanted to hear and not been honest about the dog's aggressive tendencies (toward children or adults, or with food or toys). So, we have occasionally (but not even once a year) had to have a dog who displays aggression euthanized – liability to the organization is just too great not to do so.

Financial Notes and Explanations

As of the end of 2016, we are in excellent financial shape. The table at left details all of our sources of income and expenses for the entire year. However, I want to point out that the numbers in this table are just a snapshot as of December 31, 2016.

Our financial picture changes just about daily. For example, some of the vets we use send us invoices and charge our credit card once a month (one on or around the 10th, the other near the end of the month); others charge the card every time they see one of our rescued dogs. Our two "regular" vets that bill us once a month will be charging at least some of our December expenses in January. Consequently, when Cindy Tigges and I prepare the 2016 tax return in May the total for Veterinary Services will be higher than the amount shown in the table. Other income and expenses that were accrued after the 12th of the month when our bank statement is released will show up in our account during the following month.

For the first time, our non-specific donations were higher than our Fore! Paws Golf Tournament income. We have had some very generous supporters! The many who donated during the 4th quarter of 2016 are acknowledged on the last pages of this issue. During the year, it was especially gratifying to have so many donate as a result of our plea for support for the purchase of a cargo trailer, and so many others participate in our Summer Fund Drive for Special Needs Dogs. The monies that came in during the latter dedicated fundraiser, as well as what we earned at the Paws & Pasta Dinner, helped increase the funds available in the Debbe Begley Memorial Fund.

The DBMF is, of course, open for donations at any time during the year. Donations to this *Fund* help with the cost of veterinary services and medicine for the Golden Retrievers and Golden mixes that accrue extraordinary medical expenses. Several of the 84 dogs we rescued in 2016 were in terrible condition and others needed chemotherapy, surgery, or other expensive veterinary care. The Debbe Begley Memorial Fund is used when a dog must be treated for cancer, or if the cost of a dog's total medical bills exceeds \$5,000 – the excess is taken out of this *Fund*. Consequently, it is most important that we keep a healthy amount of cash in this Fund.

In general, all donors are sent thank you letters in January. For 2016 donations, I prepared 384 letters and many of those acknowledged multiple donations – I had a total of 737 line items on my Donations spreadsheet, 75 item-only donations mostly for the golf tournament, and another dozen In-Kind donations! We are obligated by law to acknowledge all donations of \$250 or more. However, if you made even one donation of as little as \$5 during the year, you got a thank you letter if I had a US mail address for you - it was just the right thing to do. Please let me know if you made a donation in 2016 and did not receive a letter, or if your letter was inaccurate, in which case I will redo it right away.

How much do we spend on any one dog? What is the average expense per dog over the course of a year? These are questions we need to be able to answer not infrequently. Until now, the process of getting the information has been tedious and frustrating, but that is about to change.

Debbie Ball has taken on the task of keeping track of how much money we spend on any one dog. She is a master of spreadsheet creation and manipulation and has spent a great deal of time since November 2016 putting together a spreadsheet of all vet charges for all our 2016 and some of our 2015-rescued dogs (the ones whose expenses spilled over into 2016).

The results of Debbie's efforts will help in numerous ways:

- when someone asks how much we have spent on a particular dog, we will be able to find out with one e-mail or phone call or a glance at the spreadsheet;
- the spreadsheet will be especially useful to me or whoever writes the *Diamonds In The Ruff* column for this newsletter;
- when Sue Vallie and I prepare the Golden Retriever Club of America's National Rescue Committee's Annual Survey, many of the statistics that report requires will be easily obtained from Debbie's spreadsheet;
- the spreadsheet will also be useful to Jolene Schlichter, our Grant Writer, when she has to present numbers in a grant proposal.

Until now and fortunately continuing, Cindy Tigges, our Organization Accountant, has tracked money spent in each expense category. Debbie Ball is now tracking expenses *per dog*. As we have found, it is often frustrating to get this information just from the vet invoices and impossible to get it from the credit card statements which just present a total charged by a vet – the charges and the invoices have to be cross-referenced and the details pulled out, which is what Debbie can now do with her spreadsheet. We appreciate her efforts so much, and Cindy's, too.

Please be advised that unless a month is very busy financially, bank deposits are made only twice a month, on or around the 15th and on the last banking day of the month. So, if you send a check that we receive between the 2nd and the 12th of the month, for example, it will not appear as cashed in your bank statement until after the 15th.

Also, thank you letters are generated at the end of the year unless requested sooner.

However, with increasing attention required by their special needs children, they felt Maisy was not getting the time and attention she so justly deserved. They felt finding a new home for Maisy was the right thing to do. Maisy did require spay surgery when she came into Rescue, and



we gave her a health addendum to repeat valley fever and kidney function tests in the future, as she originally tested weak positive for valley fever. She loves to swim and play fetch with balls and tug on a rope toy. She is good on a leash and loves walks. Sounds like the perfect Golden girl for some very lucky family and that family is Ed, Chris and Gracie in Tempe. **Maisy** is now getting all the attention she deserves!

16-065 Barnie is a 2-year-old Golden boy who is full of life. His surrendering owner had a job transfer out of town and left **Barnie** with someone who was not used to having a bottle rocket in their home. Hence, the phone call to *AGR*. **Barnie** did well with his medical check-up and just needed the required neuter surgery. Next, **Barnie** needed to find an active family. Mora, Dan

and children of Anthem, who also have a Border Collie mix named **Timber** and an African parrot, were just the ticket for **Barnie**. Upon **AGR's** suggestion, the family registered for weekly obedience classes at **Partners Dog Training School** in Cave Creek. **Barnie** is the star of the class! 16-076 Emma, a healthy 15-monthold purebred female Golden now called **Samantha**, was reported to have started fighting with the other dog in the household, a Corgi mix. The dogs were living in an apartment with five children ranging in age from 6 months to 15 years of age. Although the owner said that **Emma** did well with the children, we were still careful in placing

her. Kathy and Steve in Chandler were ideal for her. They have no children and no other dogs. Steve said, She has exceeded our greatest expectations. They went shopping for her supplies and made her a dog tag. The only issue they witnessed is that she doesn't like to be left alone – is always by their side and wants to come in immediately when let out. 16-077 Sammy and 16-078 Harley are Goldendoodles that have been raised together, so we felt it was important to keep them together. Sammy is 6 years old and Harley is 4, but they are still both quite energetic and playful. They

could have presented a real challenge for our Placement Team, but we had an application submitted by Jane and Tom of Glendale that indicated a perfect potential placement. They had seen the pair on our website and had fallen in love with them. Then they saw them in person when their foster brought them to the *Glendale Hometown Christmas Parade* and that

16-081 Ranger, a 3-year-old blond purebred male Golden, was living in an apartment on a military base in Yuma. He was originally rescued in Okinawa, Japan, while the owners were stationed there. He was brought to the States when he was a year old. His owner decided that **Ranger** needed a yard and also a family that has more

time for a dog. Apparently, **Ranger** is pretty rambunctious and needs training. He loves people but will jump on them. He pulls on a leash and although he likes car rides, he is restless. But we did find out he not only knows "sit" and "high five", but "lie down" as well. He really is such a sweet boy and we are having fun with him. Best of luck to the entire family. **Stanley**, you seem to have won the jackpot with a family that understands you and wants to help you become the best dog possible!

Diamonds in the Ruff By Deb Orwig

Diamonds in the Ruff are dogs on whom AGR has had to spend at least \$1,000. In this column in the November issue of The Golden Paw, we featured 15-069 Shaggy, 16-032 Missy, 16-039 Kenna, 16-043 Sandy, 16-047 Sedona, 16-052 Nala and 16-060 Chase. Following up on these dogs... All medical issues except for Shaggy's and Sandy's have been treated and resolved.

15-069 Shaggy continues to need *AGR's* help with medical expenses. Last year, shortly after he was returned to *AGR* by previous adopters, we discovered he had a thyroid tumor that is inoperable. The vet started **Shaggy** on chemo in September 2015 but has had to change the type of chemo drug several times, as one will work for a while to keep the tumor from growing and



then loses its effectiveness. **Shaggy** has needed to have changes to his chemo not only because of tumor growth but also because he has lung lesions that have increased periodically, not enough to cause breathing issues yet, but without chemo changes they would have multiplied quickly. To see **Shaggy** swim or otherwise enjoy life, you would never know he has cancer, so our treatment has

\$3,201; in 2016, his treatment has cost *AGR* an additional \$9,900, \$2,180 just in the fourth quarter. When we got his original diagnosis, we knew his treatment would be expensive – cancer treatment always is – which is why *AGR* chose to put **Shaggy** in our *Gentle Paws Hospice Adoption* program – he has been adopted, but *AGR* continues to pay his bills. Thanks to an anonymous donor who has sent us a significant donation every month for months because one of his own dogs passed away from cancer, we have had to take only about a quarter of **Shaggy**'s expenses out of the *Debbe Begley Memorial Fund*. Even so, the amount of money in this Fund continues to decrease. Our *Special Needs Dogs Summer Fund Drive* in August bolstered up this Fund, as did the *Paws & Pasta* event in November. Please consider contributing.



16-039 Kenna, who has been adopted, was actually our most expensive rescue in 2016. Her vet bills amounted to **\$9,957**, but only \$404 of that was in the fourth quarter. She developed aspiration pneumonia, had tick fever, and had to have elbow joint debridement. She also had to have a work-up for seizure control. Now, though, the pneumonia is gone, she is walking well, and the sei-

zures are under control with medication.



16-043 Sandy's vet cost was \$5,358 for the year 2016, \$1,086 in the fourth quarter. We have a lengthy history with Sandy. She originally came to us in March of 2015 (15-024). Long story short, this lovely 8-year-old was a mess with many health issues, including horrible allergies and terrible ear infections that required our vet to do complete ear canal reconstructions. During 2015, Sandy's medical care

cost us over \$8,568; the total above is the amount we have spent on her in 2016, so altogether she has cost AGR \$13,926! We had her allergy tested, started her on a high-quality food which had none of her no-nos in it, and started her on Apoquel, a relatively new allergy-treatment medication that has been shown to be very effective with some other AGR dogs. Sandy was adopted with a contract addendum that provided for AGR to cover the cost of her medication for 6 months. However, in June of this year, the adopters surrendered her back to AGR complaining that they could no longer handle her continuing medical expenses. Unfortunately, they had not taken good care of her, perhaps because of their financial problems. When she came back into Rescue, she was severely underweight, again had bad ear infections, and was scratching incessantly from untreated allergies. She also had a UTI that required antibiotic treatment. Sandy was placed as a Gentle Paws Hospice Adoption with a wonderful family who had adopted another one of our dogs. She will be well cared for, and *AGR* will pay for all medical bills for the remainder of her life.



16-062 Bud came into Rescue as a stray. He was loaded with ticks and had to be treated for tick fever. He also had fairly severe allergies that had affected his eyes and skin, so he needed antibiotics and allergy medication. The allergy medication of choice these days is Apoquel; it is expensive (about \$85 per month), but it works to control allergy symptoms. Additionally, Bud tested weak positive for

valley fever and needed retesting after 90 days. He also was put on Prozac to help with serious anxiety behavior. He could not be trusted around other dogs (got in a fight with his first foster's male Golden) and since we did not have a suitable foster available, we had to board him until the right family applied to adopt him. **Bud's** expenses for fourth quarter 2016 were \$1,383.

Since he has been adopted, **16-066 Charlie's** story was already presented in "Magic Moments" on page 15. Suffice it to say here that **Charlie's** legs had been severely damaged, because he most likely had been hit by a car. For ten days, he was hospitalized in the critical care area at **AMSC**. He required constant medical attention and daily cleaning



of his wounds and changes of the bandages on his legs. At first, the vets were not sure the legs would heal without surgery. However, the laser treatments they used daily really helped and after a few days they realized that surgery would not be needed. Dr. Wheeler, the Medical Director at *AMSC*, predicted that **Charlie's** legs would heal and that there would be no lasting effects of the injuries. Had anyone besides a vet with lots of experience under his belt seen those wounds, they never would have believed that! Fortunately, Dr. Wheeler was correct. Although he probably has one stashed away in his office, we have a magic wand we intend to give him at some point. **Charlie's** vet costs amounted to \$1,672. We sincerely thank those supporters who specifically made donations to help with **Charlie's** bills (see page 37).

Despite spending a lot of money on them, we lost three of the dogs we rescued near the end of 2016, 16-074 Calvin/Tucker, 16-080 Nick and 16-084 Pancho. All of these dogs were in bad shape when they came to us. Tucker was a 10-year-old that had been turned into the Gila County Shelter in Globe – our Placement Manager noticed him when she was reviewing dogs being advertised on PetHarbor; Nick was an 8-year-old rescued from the Westside *MCCACS* shelter; and Pancho was a 10-year-old surrendered by his owner due to the owner's poor financial situation.

16-074 Tucker had two large masses. one on his chest and a gross-looking and odorous tumor under his tail near his anus. The chest mass turned out to be benign, but the anal tumor was cancerous and its location rendered it inoperable. We started **Tucker** on chemotherapy, which seemed to shrink the anal tumor and reduce the odor, but within a couple weeks, the tumor had grown again and



the odor had returned. The vet ultimately determined that nothing could be done to save him. When Tucker was sent to the Bridge, his wonderful adoptive mom, Penny, was with him. She had doted on him, cooked for him, and loved him for only five weeks, but they were probably the best weeks of his life. Tucker's vet cost amounted to \$1,690.



16-080 Nick. AGR received an emergency call from the Westside shelter regarding dear, sweet Nick. Without any hesitation, our wonderful Transport Team of Connie and Nick picked up Nick and took him to Academy West Animal Hospital. Nick had ticks and an infected

foot, and he was vomiting his food. He was extremely emaciated. IV fluids were started along with pain medications and diagnostic testing. The AWAH vet recommended that Nick have an ultrasound done, so we moved him to AMSC instead of waiting for days for the mobile ultrasound vet to come to AWAH. Nick was diagnosed with an advanced stage of megaesophagus – it was not a surprise since he could not keep any food down. Unfortunately, this condition is terminal. The vets at AMSC recommended sending Nick to the Bridge. Nick was not alone during his final moments. A couple of *AGR* angels were at his side, holding his paw, comforting him and telling him what a wonderful boy he was as he crossed the Rainbow Bridge. Nick's vet cost was \$1,377.



16-084 Pancho, obese at 98 lbs, was the last dog we rescued in 2016. He had loose stools, usually not a big deal. However, his owner must have suspected something bad but could not afford any kind of vet work. Connie and Nick drove from Glendale to Tucson to pick him up and delivered him to AMSC in north Scottsdale. Pancho's initial exam was promising - the vet actually thought Pancho

was in fairly good shape for being so overweight. However, lab work came back showing he was a little anemic with a slightly elevated white blood cell count (which might have indicated kidney issues) as well as an elevated red blood cell count and blood in his urine. Joni and Todd in Scottsdale offered to foster Pancho. They observed that he had difficulty peeing and pooping and difficulty standing and walking. He was panting a lot, so the vet did a chest X-ray – it showed nodules in his lungs. The news got worse... An ultrasound revealed that **Pancho** had metastasized prostate cancer. He had never been neutered. Poor guy was just too far along for us to do anything other than send him peacefully to the Bridge. In the nine days we had him in our care, Pancho's vet bills amounted to \$1,451. Donations have already been received to help AGR with Pancho's bills (see page 37), but we will gladly accept other donations for **Pancho** or for any other specific dog at any time.


There is only one thing missing. They are not with their special person who loved them on Earth.

Sir Bark A. Lot is a program that was designed as a collaboration between Colleen Walski, founder and CEO of Scott Foundation, and Deb Orwig, President of Arizona Golden Rescue. One of Scott Foundation's goals is to help develop kind and caring kids by "cultivating mindfulness and bringing together the arts and education in a series of uplifting experiences in a pathway through service." They like to refer to their goal as helping children become Selfless Superheroes. Arizona Golden Rescue was chosen as a role model that consistently demonstrates kindness and selfless service.

One of the things I have heard most frequently in *Scott Foundation* meetings I've attended is about their efforts to teach children to go beyond themselves – "to sit with those sitting alone, to be a friend to the lonely, to encourage others, to think about other people, to share, to look for the good – this is how they'll change the world." *Scott Foundation* wants to help foster children learn at the emotional level, to help them learn to make good choices so they can live better, more peaceful and loving lives.

Kids in the foster care system have had difficult lives, and they need encouragement and guidance in order to see that the life they are in does not have to be the life they have forever. The purpose of the *Sir Bark A. Lot* program is to expose children from foster and group homes to examples of leadership and compassion for others. Interaction with our dogs and volunteers encouraged the children to think about what it means to be a responsible dog owner and how they might accomplish kindness to others through interaction with dogs. Why dogs?
