Arizona Golden Rescue has had a busy winter/early spring season with lots of activities and many volunteer opportunities. Our Director of Activities, Denise Padavano, and her assistant, Jeanne Wegener, work very diligently to plan and prepare for a variety of events. The variety keeps us from getting bored doing the same thing again and again. We meet new people at each type of event. The new events, especially, enable us to spread the word about AGR – who we are, what we do, and how we do it – to different groups of people. Even at the *PACC911* events where there may be 60 or more different rescue groups, we have had success at encouraging people to apply for adoption and/or become members.

Preparing for events can sometimes seem like an endless job, and definitely a worrisome one, especially new events because it is hard to anticipate problems that might arise. Denise and Jeanne are both superbly well-organized and make every effort to ensure things "go right." To those who do not see everything that goes on behind the scenes (most of you), it may seem like these ladies just wave a magic wand and an event materializes in its full-blown and wonderful form, and we make a lot of money. However, a lot of anxiety and sleepless nights accompany the preparation of new events in particular.

The wine-tasting event last year in September is a great example. We had never done such an event, did not know the owners of Pavilion Art Gallery when we met them at Trail's End after the Parada Del Sol and they invited us to use their facility. We did not have any idea where to get the wine donated or what to serve with it or where to get the food donated, did not have a clue about possible silent auction items, and could not judge how this event would be received by our members - did enough of them enjoy drinking wine to make it worth the time to organize such an event? Were those who did not drink wine willing to attend anyway (we had water, soda and non-alcoholic wine available) just to socialize and to possibly bid on whatever silent auction items we put together? Turns out we had just about the maximum number of guests attend that the facility could accommodate comfortably, and we made \$45 shy of \$9,000. It was a thrill that this new event produced such great results, and these were directly attributed to all the planning and preparation by Denise and Jeanne that had gone into producing the event.

We hope to have a similar result with our new *Pickleball Tournament* on August 3, 2025. For those of you who know nothing about this sport, I have done some research on it and have included in this newsletter a "Primer on Pickleball" (pages 6-7). Perhaps you would like to learn to participate in this sport? Perhaps you already play and enjoy it. Perhaps you know, like I do about myself, that your body would not allow you to play and you'll attend just as an observer, maybe come to indulge in the very nice brunch buffet that will be available, and come to watch others enjoy playing. The tournament will be held indoors, very important if we want to do anything in August in Arizona! Dogs that are people and dog-friendly will be welcome at *Chicken N Pickle*, too. If you are interested in helping with the planning and preparation, contact Denise. At the least, please consider joining us in some way for this new and exciting event. What is PACC911?

At a recent meeting of volunteers, most of whom had helped in one way or another at more than one of our activities, I was asked, "What is **PACC911**?" Since some readers do not get past page 3 in the newsletter, I want to describe here this terrific organization that helps us in so many ways.



PACC911 is an acronym for "**Phoenix Animal Care Coalition**, call us if you need emergency funds (that's what the 911 refers to)." **PACC911** is a nonprofit organization whose purpose is to raise money to help Rescue groups rescue animals in need. We use the "partner symbol" at left whenever we describe a **PACC911** event.

Their website, PACC911.org, states: "*PACC911* brings together over 140 animal welfare organizations throughout Arizona to create a potent animal rescue community that works together under a unified umbrella." This organization was founded by Bari Mears in 1999 with just a few rescue groups; *AGR* has been a "rescue partner" since 2009 when we incorporated.

There are various "funds" that rescue groups can tap for financial assistance. For example, I recently submitted a grant request for \$100 per adult animal for five dogs over 1 year of age for help with spay and neuter expenses for a maximum of \$500. We got the grant for just a morning's work on my part – well worth my effort. *PACC911* will also offer anywhere from \$500 to \$1,500 or more for one animal's rescue, especially if the animal is in critical health and needs emergency attention. During 2024, we actually received a total of \$7,000 in grants from *PACC911*, and to date have already been granted \$1,100. We are very grateful for these funds.

Adoptathons

Several times per year, *PACC911* offers Rescue groups the opportunity to interact with the public at the Adoptathons they sponsor in various parts of the Phoenix Metro area. Rescue groups are encouraged to attend at least one Adoptathon during the year – attending more is usually beneficial to the Rescue. *AGR* has already

had a booth at three; we will usually attend four or five during the year. We always attend the event held in Anthem and one at Toyota of Surprise. This year, we also had a presence at Berge Toyota in Mesa and are planning to go to the Adoptathon at Pet Supplies North Scottsdale on Sunday, December 7 and maybe at least one other - the fall/winter Adoptathon schedule was just released, but no attendance decisions have been made yet. PACC911 advertises each event and hundreds of people attend, many of whom are looking to adopt a new family member or at least talk to a group that rescues the breed they are looking for. Some of the organizations that attend the Adoptathons do onsite adoptions, but many are like AGR - we talk to people interested in adopting a Golden Retriever, Goldendoodle or other Golden mix and explain our adoption process. We bring already-adopted dogs that have come through our program, so that people can see the type of dog they might get if they apply. Those adopters who come with their dogs are usually so proud of the dog(s) they have rescued from *AGR* that they want to show them off to the public. The dogs enjoy the attention, too.

At the Adoptathons, our dogs wear attractive donation vests we supply and usually collect more money in the vest pockets than the amount that ends up in the donation jars we keep on our booth tables. We are allowed to sell our merchandise and make a significant amount of money from sales of our unique, high-quality handmade items. Please read the articles on pages 24 and 27-29.

Rescued Treasures Charity Boutique

In addition to Adoptathons at which *PACC911* offers raffles, they raise money in several other ways. They run *Rescued Treasures Charity Boutique*, located at 3841 E Thunderbird Road, Ste 103, Phoenix, AZ. This very excellent thrift store has a terrific, artfully-arranged selection of ladies' clothing, accessories, home furnishings and accents, animal-related books, animal boutique items, and much more. The arrangement of items is especially attractive during the holiday season. The store is open Tuesday through Saturday from 10 AM to 4 PM. Go visit!

Glimmer of Hope

A major source of funding is the *Glimmer of Hope Gala* that *PACC911* sponsors every year in November. They have many wonderful silent auction items available for bid and many individual and corporate sponsors. There is also a special raffle for a new Toyota 4-Runner SR5 sponsored by *Valley Toyota Dealers*. In 2024, *Glimmer of Hope* raised almost \$400,000! Donating to *PACC911* at any time is tax deductible.

Chuck Waggin' Pet Food Pantry

One other very worthwhile activity that **PACC911** sponsors is the **Chuck Waggin' Pet Food Pantry**. Volunteers collect and distribute unwanted pet food to families in need, feeding pets during financial difficulties. This innovative program helps keep beloved family pets home where they belong, as opposed to being surren-

dered to a shelter or Rescue. The program will take dog food, cat food, kitty litter, bowls, leashes and collars, and toys. Yes, opened food bags and pet food up to a year past its expiration date will be accepted. So, if you purchase a food your dog refuses to eat or to which the dog has an adverse reaction, or maybe your dog's dietary needs change and you need to use a different food, why not donate the unused food to the *Chuck Waggin' Pet Food Pantry*? AGR now has an Instagram presence! The page was created in early February of 2025 by one of our volunteers, Hayley, and can be found by searching "arizonagoldenrescue" on Instagram. The goal of the Instagram page is to create another method in which AGR can reach more people, mostly a younger demographic who do not use Facebook, and more dogs can find loving homes. The page posts dogs available for adoption and updates when they are adopted, as well as success stories and information on upcoming events! So far, the page has garnered 84 followers and counting! Tagging "arizonagoldenrescue" in any personal Instagram stories/posts and encouraging your friends and family to follow and spread the word are all great ways to get more attention and get more dogs adopted! So far, multiple posts have been sent from followers to their friends/family, and several direct messages have been answered regarding questions about the dogs and how to move forward with the process of adoption. The Instagram page allows those who are interested in a specific dog to DM (direct message) Hayley with questions to which she can quickly answer and direct them through the proper channels to help them foster and, hopefully, eventually adopt a dog.

A Pickleball Primer

There is an extensive article about pickleball in Wikipedia online. I will summarize it here, but if you are interested in learning about pickleball, I suggest you read the entire article and some of the many (117) references it cites. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/ Pickleball.

<u>History</u>

The sport of pickleball was invented in 1965 as a children's backyard game! It has enjoyed a recent upsurge in popularity, though – by 1990, the sport was being played in all 50 states. Pickleball was invented on Bainbridge Island, Washington by three dads – Joel Pritchard, Bill Bell, and Barney McCallum – who worked together to develop an activity to keep their bored kids busy on a rainy day.

The Name's the Game

Although there are at least two other etymologies of the name "pickleball", the most-accepted version is that it was derived from the name of the Pritchards' family dog, **Pickles**. People who have adopted this sport are known as "pickleheads." Check out this site: www.pickleheads.com



The game combines aspects of badminton, tennis and ping pong. It requires the use of a court (like a badminton court, which is smaller than a tennis court) with a net (about the height of a tennis court net); a flat, solid paddle (usually a rectangular shape with a smooth surface); and a light-weight plastic ball with holes on the surface like a wiffle ball only smaller. There are standard accepted sizes and weights for paddles and balls. This publication lists all the specifications: https://usapickleball.org/whatis-pickleball/official-rules/


Equipment

Most sporting goods stores and even Walmart, Target and, of course, Amazon.com, carry a variety of paddles (so many, it's hard to choose!) and balls. Paddles range in price from about \$10 each to as much as \$280; there are many available in a reasonable price range of \$30-\$60. 3-packs of balls range from \$3 to \$9, 6-packs, 12-packs and even 48-packs are also available. Balls with smaller holes are generally used for outdoor play to minimize the effects of wind, but any sanctioned ball can be used for either indoor or outdoor play. If you're a beginner, it might be advisable to rent a

paddle at an indoor facility and play a few games until you get the "feel" of the paddle before you invest money in buying one.

<u>The Court</u>

Rules regarding court and equipment, order of play, and manner of play, are based on the USA Pickleball 2025 Official Rulebook or the Equipment Standards Manual. The size of the court is the same as for a badminton court, 20' x 44'. The net is 34" high in center, 38" at the edges. On each side of the net back 7 feet is a non-volley zone; the area beyond the non-volley line to the baseline (back 22 feet) and bounded by the side-



lines is the service court, which is divided into left and right sides. Unofficially, the non-volley zone is commonly referred to as "The Kitchen."

Game Play

Games are fast-paced, usually lasting only 15-20 minutes. Games are generally played to a score of 11; a winning team must lead by two points, otherwise the play continues past 11 points until a team leads by two points. The cumulative score must be announced before each serve. The server alternates between the right and left service courts until their team commits a fault. A serve must land in the diagonally opposite service court on the opponent's side of the net. The serve receiver must allow the ball to bounce once before returning the ball to the server's side of the net. Once the receiver has returned the ball over the net, the serving side must also allow the ball to bounce once before returning the ball to the non-serving side. This is known as the two-bounce rule.

After the first two returns, either side may volley the ball – that is, return it before it bounces. The ball can never bounce more than once before it is returned. No player may volley the ball while standing in the non-volley zone or touching any of the lines around the non-volley zone. Pickleball utilizes side-out scoring, meaning only the serving side may score a point. The serving team earns one point each time the non-serving team commits a fault. Neither team earns a point when the serving team commits a fault.

The server may use a Volley-serve: underarm serve strokes are required, and there must not be any spin imparted to the ball. Or, a Drop-serve may be used: the ball is dropped to the ground and allowed to bounce before the server's paddle strikes it; the ball cannot be tossed or impelled by the server in any way. The ball can bounce more than once before being hit, and unlike the volley serve, there are no restrictions on how the player must hit the ball.

Faults include:

• either of the server's feet touches the baseline, the court, or the area outside the imaginary extensions of the cen-

terline or sideline prior to striking the ball

- not hitting the serve into the opponent's diagonally opposite service court
- volleying the ball when returning a serve
- volleying the ball when returning the first service return
- not hitting the ball beyond the net
- not hitting the ball before it bounces twice on one side of the net
- hitting the ball so it lands out of bounds (outside the court lines)
- stepping into the non-volley zone, or touching any of lines around the non-volley zone, in the act of volleying the ball
- touching the net with any part of the body, clothing, paddle, or assistance device
- crossing the plane of the net, if not in the process of striking the ball

Pickleball in Arizona

Arizona has been active in the development of the enthusiasm over pickleball. In 2001, pickleball was included as a demonstration sport in the Arizona Senior Olympics (ASO) with 100 participants. The pickleball tournament was held at the *Happy Trails RV Resort* in Surprise, Arizona (yes, we will be advertising our tournament at this place) and within five years included 275 participants. USA Pickleball held its first U.S. Pickleball National Championships in Buckeye, Arizona, November 2009! There are at least 400 pickleball locations with at least 2,386 courts in Arizona. Arizona has the 10th-most pickleball courts in the United States. Some courts are indoor; some are outdoor. Some courts are lighted, some are not. Some are free to play on, some are not.

If you are a beginner and you want to learn to play, we suggest taking a lesson or two in a pickleball facility near you. Many of the indoor facilities offer lessons. Check out your city here: https://www.pickleheads.com/courts/us/arizona.

At our tournament, play will be administered by a professional referee. The game can be played by beginners or experienced players. Anyone who can't or won't play is encouraged to attend to watch and cheer on the players. There is no charge for just being there, unless you want to indulge in the excellent brunch buffet.

VOLUNTEERING

AGR's success is largely due to the heart and soul of our volunteers. We have many volunteer opportunities available. Below are a few ways you can help:

FOSTER CARE

Foster homes are critical to our organization in the care and nurturing of newly rescued Goldens and Golden mixes. We need fosters who are willing to open their hearts and homes to offer loving support to these wonderful dogs while waiting for that new special family to call their own. Please visit the FOSTER PROCESS page from the website menu (arizonagoldenrescue.org) for more information.

FUNDRAISING EVENTS

Volunteers are needed to represent AGR at various events to share our mission and speak to the public about our adoption process. In addition, volunteers are needed to help transport, set up and pack up merchandise, tables and tents, and help monitor merchandise sales.

SOLICITATION

AGR is always in need of individuals to contact businesses to ask for gift cards, and items for our raffles and silent auctions. This can be a time-consuming effort with repeated visits or phone calls to different establishments, but the reward is in acquiring items for our fundraisers which help to offset AGR's veterinary expenses.

HEALTH CARE

Volunteers are needed to arrange veterinary care for all AGR dogs - both routine care and treatment of illness and injuries, and then release them for adoption. Requires database work with entry of notes and reminder dates, also good organizational skills and communication skills.

HOME EVALUATIONS

Volunteers are needed to conduct on-site home visits for prospective adoptive families to ensure safety and soundness for an AGR dog's placement. You will use an outline template to ask questions and record answers, make observations and a recommendation, then use our database to type in the answers to the online form.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

Join our Membership team, which is responsible for coordinating all new and renewal AGR memberships. This generally involves data entry into our database, also usage of Word and Excel doing a "mail merge" to produce letters for renewals, and follow-up emails or phone contacts to former members that have not responded.

PLACEMENT

We can always use volunteers to help identify potential adoptive families for our new intake dogs, matching the dog's characteristics with the best possible approved family, entering notes in the database on all contacts, generating emails and text messages, and requesting transports. Good communication skills are needed, along with familiarity with Excel usage, and comfort in doing data entry into our database.

TRANSPORT

Do you love to drive? Compassionate volunteers are needed to transport dogs all over the Valley (and sometimes to outlying areas) from surrendering owners or shelters to veterinarians or foster homes, also to potential adopters, and to and from vet visits. A larger vehicle that can accommodate a crate (such as an SUV, minivan, or wagon) is helpful, along with being comfortable handling unknown dogs.



Some Rare disorders/diseases in dogs that AGR has treated

Ectopic Ureter



We have had three dogs that were diagnosed with ectopic ureter issues. One had surgery before she was surrendered and had her ureters placed in the correct position. One had surgery that didn't work, so we had to have another surgery done. Another one came in before surgery and *AGR* had one of the ureters moved to the correct position in the bladder. All three in our experience have been Goldendoodles.

18-037 Kona had surgery that failed to correct her dribbling problem

When a dog is dribbling or suspected of urinary tract infection and that is ruled out, the possibility of an ectopic ureter should be considered. Ureters are the tubes that carry urine from the kidneys to the bladder. A relatively rare canine birth defect sometimes results in one or both of these tubes emptying away from their normal location in the bladder. And that was what happened with the first two dogs and with a recent small Goldendoodle that had one of her ureters placed back in the correct position. Surgery is the most effective way to treat ectopic ureters in dogs, but sometimes medications are still needed to prevent dribbling. Estrogen or synthetic estrogen can help with any leakage.

Von Willebrand's Disease

Von Willebrand's Disease, a genetic disorder, impairs a dog's ability to clot blood. Dogs with this condition lack a sufficient amount of von Willebrand factor, a crucial component in blood clotting. The disease can lead to excessive bleeding, even from minor injuries, posing significant risks during surgeries or injuries. Certain breeds are predisposed to this condition, emphasizing the need for genetic awareness and testing. Dobermans,

German Shepherd Dogs and Labradors are most afflicted. We have rescued one Golden Retriever that we discovered had von Willebrand's. In order to do the needed surgery on the dog, a clotting factor for the blood had to be given during surgery to make sure his blood clotted. Most people are unaware of the various disorders that cause lack of clotting, and it is usually safest to do a clotting factor test on a dog before any surgery.

Addison's Disease

Addison's disease, or hypoadrenocorticism, is a condition where the adrenal glands fail to produce enough essential hormones like cortisol and aldosterone. This disease can be challenging to diagnose due to its non-specific symptoms, which can mimic other conditions. It's more commonly seen in young to middle-aged dogs, and early detection and treatment can significantly improve the prognosis.

Symptoms of Addison's Disease are often vague, including lethargy, vomiting, diarrhea, and sometimes severe episodes of collapse in stressful situations. Because of its elusive pature Addison's Disease is often

its elusive nature, Addison's Disease is often diagnosed through exclusion and confirmed with specific blood tests. Understanding these symptoms and the importance of regular veterinary check-



ups can aid in early detection, greatly impacting the management and quality of life for dogs with this condition.

Myasthenia Gravis

This disease attacks the link between a dog's nerves and muscles. MG is one of the autoimmune diseases; the main cause might be that a puppy's immune system is

In our rescue experience, 15-096 Ford is the only dog who suffered from Myasthenia Gravis – he passed away at age 19 months. None of the puppies he sired (Vin Orwig is one of them) have, to our knowledge, ever developed the symptoms Ford had.

harming its neuromuscular junction. However, cancer, failure of the thyroid gland, birth defects, and other conditions could be an explanation, but an autoimmune disease is difficult to treat, as the body attacks itself.

The first symptom of Myasthenia Gravis is muscle weakness. In some isolated cases, it seemed that only a few muscles were affected, but in other circumstances, the whole body was suffering. We've had one known dog that was affected with this at a very young age: **15-096 Ford**. He became progressively worse, developed megaesophagus and eventually had to be euthanized. Supportive care and medications can sometimes help a young dog get through the crisis period, and doing so will give the necessary support to a puppy in order to live a normal life.

Megaesophagus

Megaesophagus in dogs is a disorder in which the esophagus gets larger in size and consequently loses its ability to transport food. When your dog eats food, the presence of food sends signals to the brain's swallowing center. The swallowing center then sends a signal to the swallow reflex. If the esophagus is enlarged, the muscles that squeeze the food down to the stomach do not work and food either remains in the esophagus or the dog regurgitates the food.

Dogs are either born with a congenital megaesophagus condition or can acquire it later in life from some other neurological issue such as Myasthenia Gravis or issues such as: blockage in the esophagus by scar tissue, tumor, or a foreign body; damage to the muscles and nerves of the esophagus, inflammation in the esophagus, exposure to toxins, or hormonal diseases.

Regurgitation is not vomiting, and food comes out usually right after eating or can happen later on but will not look digested. Food can be aspirated into the lungs when this happens, and pneumonia can result very quickly. If the condition is diagnosed in the early puppy stage, Sildenafil medication can help the esophagus muscles. Determining if food needs to be solid or liquid or mush can help. Dogs also do best when eating standing up so the food can drop directly into the stomach. Sometimes surgery can be helpful. Most dogs that acquire Mega E in old age have a more difficult time with treatment for the condition.

If your dog starts having ANY unusual activity or sudden unusual issues, take your dog to your vet.

Diamonds in the Ruff By Debbie Ball Director of Operations debbie.ball@arizonagoldenrescue.org

Diamonds in the Ruff are dogs on which *AGR* has incurred at least \$2,000 in expenses. For the first quarter of 2025, we had seven dogs that met this benchmark. Please consider donating to help with the expenses of a specific dog, or just earmark it for *Diamonds in the Ruff*. All donations are tax deductible to the extent allowed by law, of course, and will be acknowledged as such.

23-025 Charlie was originally surrendered in May 2023 as a 2-year-old neutered Golden Retriever mix whom the owner could no longer care for, as she was moving. He received all the usual veterinary updates and in June 2023 was evaluated by *Eyecare for Animals* for eye issues. In July 2023, Charlie was adopted by Kim and Eduardo in Chandler. Charlie had a very unique appearance in



what seemed to be a swollen and wrinkled face – he looked like he was part Shar Pei mix. In November 2024, the adopters had **Charlie** evaluated and he was found to have food allergies and hypothyroidism; treatment for both were prescribed. Since his once-chronic swollen face was then lessened, it was found that **Charlie's** eyelids were folding inward in a major and unhealthy way. Since *AGR* had originally offered eye surgery which was declined, the Board determined to cover the expense of **Charlie's** entropion eyelids surgery, which was done in late January 2025. This eye surgery in 2025 totaled **\$3,580**.

24-075 Bear was rescued by *AGR* in early November 2024 as a then 10-month-old unneutered male purebred Golden Retriever whose prior family had young children and no time for **Bear**. He received all his initial vetting in November and was placed with Ben and Kara in Gilbert. In mid-January, **Bear** was seen at one of our partner veterinarians for an



emergency exam and X-rays due to vomiting and lethargy, which was diagnosed as pneumonia. Unfortunately, this placement did not work out for various reasons, and **Bear** was returned to *AGR* in mid-February. In mid-March, **Bear** was placed with Doug and Leslie in Scottsdale pending finalization. He was finally neutered on March 31st. **Bear's** first-quarter 2025 expenses were **\$2,192**.

24-080 Juno came into AGR in November 2024 as a 4-year-old

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
male Golden mix transferred from a Rescue in Mexico. He was already neutered. He is a sweet, passive and gentle boy, good with other dogs, too. He had had an unfortunate accident resulting in one of his eyes needing removal. Upon medical evaluation with one of our partner veterinarians, **Juno** was found to have ear infection issues and also a missing right ear

drum, so he is probably deaf in that ear. In early January 2025, **Juno** was adopted by Lisa and Joe in Sun City. *AGR* agreed to pay for **Juno's** needed dental work, which required a dental enamel hypoplasia treatment to smooth rough edges, plus a bonding agent. **Juno's** expenses for first quarter 2025 were **\$3,980**.

24-082 Deegan is an adorable purebred male Golden Retriever surrendered in late November 2024 as an 11-week-old puppy when his prior owners realized they were "in over their heads" trying to manage a puppy while working full-time. He received all the usual vaccinations and a needed ear cleaning in February. While **Deegan** was in foster care, he accidentally ate the squeaker from a



toy, requiring an emergency enterotomy for removal. **Deegan** has been adopted by his foster mom, Judy in Phoenix, and is doing well. Total 2025 costs for **Deegan** so far have been **\$7,284** (that was one expensive toy squeaker!), which will increase when he is old enough to be neutered at *AGR*'s expense.



24-088 Mac is our last rescued dog from 2024, coming in on 12/31/24 as an 8-month-old purebred male Golden Retriever puppy. He had a chronicallyinjured right front paw, and his owners could no longer afford the medical expenses for him. **Mac** was fostered by Connie and Nick, who said he was a very sweet and playful guy, got along well with their pack of dogs, but was

constantly bothered by the bandaged paw which required frequent bandage changes. During emergency services at *VetMed*, it was discovered **Mac** had von Willebrand disease (see Liz's article on page 9), which is a genetic, lifelong bleeding disorder causing the blood to not clot properly. In late January, **Mac** had toe amputation surgery and was neutered. Amazingly, the surgeon that worked on **Mac**, Dr Lynn in Scottsdale, wanted to adopt him (his adoption is not yet finalized). After the amputated toe pathology was returned, **Mac** was found to have cutaneous/subcutaneous hemangiosarcoma. Upon consult with two oncologists, it was determined that electrochemotherapy treatments were the best suggested treatment due to **Mac's** bleeding disorder. **Mac's** expenses so far in 2025 have cost *AGR* **\$12,274**. We remain hopeful that these treatments will arrest the cancer, and we are thankful that **Mac** is in good hands with a veterinarian who wants to adopt him. We are also very grateful for financial assistance for **Mac** donated by Jeannette and David Morrocco, the *Golden Retriever Foundation* and *PACC911*.




25-005 Katana was a 13-year-old purebred Golden Retriever originally rescued in 2017. In early January 2025, his adopter found she could no longer care for him and so he was returned to *AGR*. After medical evaluation by one of our partner veterinarians, **Katana** was found to have metastatic cancer and was anorexic, so the Board determined it best to have him peacefully eu-

thanized. Expenses for Katana's evaluation and euthanasia cost AGR \$3,957.

25-006 Chloe was a 2-year-old spayed female purebred Golden Retriever who came into Rescue in mid-January with her bonded littermate sister **25-006** Frida. Their owners had young children and no time or space for the dogs any longer. Chloe had all the usual tests and vaccines updated, and both girls were placed together with an adop-



tive family in Chandler. Sadly, a very freak accident occurred in late February: while the two dogs were playing they ran head-on into each other. **Chloe** could not get up, was rushed to veterinary emergency where she was found to have a compressed spinal cord and vertebrae at an abnormal angle (i.e., her neck was broken). Late-night consults with several Board members determined the best solution was to have **Chloe** euthanized to alleviate any further pain. (Thankfully, her sister, **Frida**, seems to be fine.) Expenses for **Chloe** were **\$3,036**.



Here is something that will give you a chuckle: The funny thing about Hazel is when she gets the zoomies, she's so big I just say "get out of the way" and we laugh. She also likes to carry her bone in her mouth and launch onto the big dog bed I got her. She seems to be happy. I'm sure she misses her previous owner that passed. With her training and gentleness, I can tell she was well loved. We were truly given a gift of sweet **Hazel** and we have been blessed. What a heartwarming adoption for Hazel with Tera, Abby and Michael.

DANGER! Xylitol in Peanut Butter

People who use peanut butter in Kongs[®] or for giving their dogs medications should be careful not to buy peanut butter that contains xylitol. Xylitol is a sweetener that is used in many sugarless gums and some other sugar-free products, and **it is highly toxic to dogs**. Jif[®], Skippy[®], Peter Pan[®], and the Kroger[®] brand itself, as well as several others available at *Fry's Grocery Stores*, are all fine. If you have peanut butter in your pantry, check the label for xylitol. If it contains that chemical, do not use that brand with your dog. Be especially aware of the following brands that are known to contain xylitol: *Nutty By Nature*, *P28*, and *Nuts 'N More*. We do not know where these brands can be purchased, but you should avoid them.

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Summer Fun

It's too hot in summer in Arizona for your dogs to be outside for more than a few minutes to do their "business" unless they are going to go swimming in a pool or a lake somewhere. Even then, you have to be cautious not to allow them to be out in the heat for more than a short time (15-20 minutes), because, like people, dogs can suffer from heat stroke.

Pool Safety. Always be present by your pool and paying attention (no talking or texting on a cell phone or reading a book) when your dog is swimming. I once knew a Golden who was a good swimmer but lost her balance and fell into her pool at an angle from which she could not recover. Fortunately, her owner knew CPR, but though the dog did not drown, she ended up with brain damage.

Be careful not to allow your dog to over-do in the length of time they play/swim in the pool - many of them don't know when to quit, so you must make them before they exhaust themselves. If your pool is not fenced, it is imperative that you teach your dogs not to go into the water unless they are invited. The first time they go in without your permission, haul them out as quickly as possible and admonish them with a stern, "NO POOL!" You may have to do this more than once to get the message across. Have some toys that are only for pool use. Bring out these toys and throw them into the pool when you are available to watch the dog in the water. Whenever the dog sees those toys, he/she will know it is OK to go swimming.



Not all Goldens are natural-born swimmers. When you introduce your dog to the pool, it is not a bad idea to put a life jacket on the dog, especially if it is a puppy, and get into the pool with the dog. Support the dog under the belly with your arm, gradually lowering your arm until the dog seems to be able to stay afloat and paddle around without assistance. A life jacket for your dog is absolutely necessary if you are rid-

ing in a boat or on a surfboard or jet ski (not recommending this type of water sports equipment with a dog!).

Exposure and Heat Stroke. Limit your dog's exposure to the outdoors during the summer. If you have to leave the house, close your dog door. Do not leave your dog outside even if there is shade in your yard and you have a mister system on your patio - these are not enough to keep your dog from developing a heatrelated condition. The Humane Society of the United States cautions dog owners to respect the heat. Dogs do not sweat as humans do. They lose heat only through their paw pads and by panting. Dogs can get heat stroke and/or become dehydrated. Always keep fresh, cool water available for your dog and limit outdoor activity during the hottest part of the day. A dog can even get overheated swimming in a pool if the pool water is quite warm, so be careful with the duration of pool play, also.

Extreme temperatures can cause heatstroke. Some signs of heatstroke are heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid heartbeat, difficulty breathing, excessive thirst, lethargy, fever, dizziness, lack of coordination, profuse salivation, vomiting, a deep red or purple tongue, seizure, and unconsciousness. Dogs that are very old, very young, overweight, not conditioned to prolonged exercise, or have heart or respiratory issues are more prone to developing heat stroke. If your dog does develop any of these symptoms, move the dog into an air-conditioned area. Apply ice packs or cold towels to head, neck, and chest or run cool (not cold) water over him/her. Encourage the dog to drink small amounts of cool water or lick ice cubes. Visit a veterinarian as soon as possible.

Bored dog? If your dog cannot or will not go swimming during the hot days of summer, what are some fun things you can do with your dog to keep him/her from getting bored?

Take your dog for a ride. In the summer, quite a few of you leave the Valley Metro Area and drive north with your dogs to cooler places like Flagstaff, Munds Park or other northern Arizona cities. Lucky you if you have a house or cabin up there! As

much as he/she might enjoy it, please do not allow your dog to ride with his/ her head hanging out the window! His/her eyes could be damaged by just about anything in the air, including dust, rocks or debris thrown up by the tires of a vehicle in front of you, and bugs. (What does your car windshield look like after you go on a road trip?) Also, with open car windows... If you have an impact or have to slam heads out of the window like this! on the brakes, the dog can fly out the

open window even if it is just sitting in the seat. I had a dog fall out of an open car window years ago (before I knew better). I was going only about 5 mph in a parking lot when the dog, who was balanced on the window ledge, went over, landed wrong and broke a leg.

Indoor Games and Enrichment activities. Our dogs show us many ways to have fun and enjoy life. There are lots of games they like to play, some of which they even make up themselves. One thing is for sure... if you help your dog learn to play and have fun, he or she will probably live longer. Just like humans, dogs need mental stimulation. Games provide a way to help your dog in that way. Games also help keep your dog from becoming bored, stay out of trouble, and improve physical fitness.

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Tovs in general can offer hours of fun for many Goldens. Be careful to give your dog toys he or she cannot readily chew up, be sure the toys are size-appropriate (i.e. do not give an adult Golden a golf ball-size toy) and always supervise the dog around toys. Do not ever give a dog a toy meant for a human child. Be especially careful to keep away stuffed animals that have button-like eyes; if the dog chews off an eye and swallows it, it could get stuck in the dog's digestive system which will necessitate an expensive visit to an emergency room. If your dog likes to tear into soft toys and pull out the stuffing and the squeaker, try giving the dog a stuffless toy - many are available in the pet supply stores. Some dogs will hoard toys. Others will tease with them. If there is another dog in the household, they may like to play "keep away". Many dogs just like to carry toys around in their mouths. Sad but true, some dogs that come into Rescue have never had a toy and consequently find them of little interest.

Even better for sharpening mental acuity are toys like the Nina Ottoson Treat Puzzle Games & Toys. You can purchase many



such "intellectual" find-the-treat games at all the major pet supply stores and even at Walmart. Search on "interactive dog toys" on Amazon and you'll find many types. Chewy also carries a variety of such toys. Many dogs especially like the type where a treat can be hidden under a shape like the

one shown above. Best to start out with a Level 1 or 2 and once your dog has mastered that one, progress to Level 3 or 4.

Teach your dog how to play toy-hide-and-seek. Start by taking a favorite toy and putting it partially under a cushion or something else. Let the dog watch you, but tell him or her to "wait". If they try to grab the toy before you tell them to "find it", correct them and tell them "wait" again. Repeat until the dog actually waits until you say "find it" and then praise the dog when he pulls the toy out and let him play with it for a while. Make this game progressively harder by having the toy less and less visible. Eventually when you say "find it," the dog will find the toy even if it is completely buried under something. Having found the toy is its own reward, but praise the dog anyway for a job well done.

Another trick you can teach your dog is to put away her own toys. Most of us have a bin or a basket in which we store all our dog's toys. Place a toy on the floor and teach your dog the "get it" command by helping the dog lean down and pick up the toy. Praise the dog when she does it. After she has learned "get it" and is carrying the toy in her mouth, walk her over to the toy bin and say, "Put it away" or "drop it" or "leave it", whichever command you prefer (I use "put it away"). After you give the command, help the dog release the toy by opening the dog's mouth – be careful you don't get nipped! As soon as the toy drops into the bin, praise the dog! Repeat, repeat, repeat. Sooner or later the dog will pick up a toy when you say "get it" and go drop it in the toy bin when you say "put it away." Really. It works. Search YouTube. com for "Golden Retriever cleans house." You will be impressed and maybe even inspired!

Balls are favorite toys of many Goldens, and there are types that can be played with indoors without wrecking your house. One type of ball I found that even the most ardent ball-ripper-uppers can-



not destroy (or at least it takes a while) is the JW iSqueak Rubber Ball. Chewy sells these. The solid JW Megalast Ball is also good. A Golden can grip the large-size ball with his teeth, but it is too large (about half again as big as a tennis ball) for the dog to chow down on. I call these "Jimmy balls,"

because years ago I had a foster dog named Jimmy who could chew up just about any toy, but he could not damage the JW Ball - it was still in one piece after he had had it for over four months, a long time for any toy to last with toy-loving -i.e., toy-destroying - Goldens! The Wobble Wag Giggle Ball sound scares some dogs, but it is my boy Vin's favorite toy! Amazon sells these.



Is your dog a **TV** watcher? Some dogs are entranced by the moving pictures on a TV screen, especially if they recognize the movements as belonging to an animal - a dog, a cat, any type of wildlife.



There is a hilarious video on YouTube called "Golden retriever loves US Open tennis" every time a player hits a ball across the net, the Golden jumps up. Boing, boing, boing, boing! Animal Planet is often a favorite of canine TV watchers, especially if something like an agility competition is being aired. Nature is also a show that entrances many dogs. And when the Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show is on in February, I would imagine there may be just as many canines

watching the program as there are humans. There is even a DirectTV choice with programming content for dogs called Dog TV!

Many dogs enjoy learning **agility** routines, and it provides great exercise for both you and your dog. One of the best places to go for agility training in the Valley is Arizona Dog Sports (AZDS), 12639 N. 48th St, Phoenix. The indoor facility offers over 50 classes per week in a 4000-square-foot, air-conditioned dog gym near Central Phoenix. Consider training your dog for therapy work. AZDS also offers classes in this discipline and have trainers who are qualified to certify the dog. If you're really ambitious, you could learn how to teach your dog canine freestyle (dancing routine to music). There's an online course available that you can do on your own shedule: https://karenpryoracademy.com/courses/ canine-freestyle/






